Our Vision

To provide a holistic, multidisciplinary, home delivered, palliative care service to those suffering from life limiting conditions, particularly cancer, in the city of Mumbai, so that they may have Quality of Life and Live in Dignity till the very end.



Our Mission

To deliver, directly and through partners, a first rate palliative care service to as many as who need it in the city of Mumbai and neighbouring locales, through a well-qualified, compassionate and interdisciplinary medical team of doctors, nurses, and psychologists, so that they may live a pain-free, symptom-free, comfortable, content and dignified life, in the familiarity of their own homes, surrounded by loved ones. The goal is to ensure that the service is always of an exceptional quality and embraces the highest standards of ethics and values.

Our Ethos

Our values originate in the belief that integrity, trust, professionalism, and discipline are the cornerstones of delivering a truly compassionate and caring palliative care service; and based on our belief that every individual, irrespective of income, social status, gender, religion, caste or creed, has the right to have a dignified existence – not only in health but in sickness as well.

Who We Are

Very often when patients with serious, advanced stage disease, run out of curative options, treating doctors will ask them to go home and continue as best they can, because there is now “nothing more that can be done.” But patients who have reached a “beyond cure” stage, have a gamut of symptoms to deal with – such as unbearable pain, malignant wounds, diarrhoea, constipation, breathlessness, lymphedema, spinal cord compression, depression, and a host of others.

Such patients normally prefer to spend their last months in the comfort of their own homes, surrounded by family and friends, and with their dignity intact. They can only do that if they know they have a professionally-run palliative care service to support them for the management of their pain and other symptoms and for their psychosocial needs.

Having witnessed firsthand the difficulties that Jimmy Soli Bilimoria faced during the final phase of his cancer, his wife and children set up THE JIMMY S BILIMORIA FOUNDATION and its PALCARE service in 2015 for exactly this purpose - to eliminate the suffering that most often accompanies such serious conditions. The Foundation was launched with the support of Mr. Ratan Tata and we remain ever grateful to him.

The service is free because the lower income group patients just do not have the wherewithal to pay for the facility; and even for the middle class, patients with serious life limiting conditions, have already had curative treatments wipe out large amounts of their savings and assets.

The Palcare Team

PALCARE has 7 medical teams and between them they cover the length and breadth of Mumbai – from Colaba in the South to Virar and Kalyan in the North and Belapur on the Mainland.

Each team comprises a doctor, two nurses and a psychologist (counsellor) who visit patients in their homes, sometimes twice a week, but mostly once a week (for high priority), fortnightly (medium priority), and once in 3 weeks (for low priority) patients, depending on the condition of the patient. The team constantly follows up with video and phone calls in between visits.

Doctors take care of the patient's medical needs, prepare a treatment plan, monitor, and amend it as is needed. Nurses, who are well versed in palliation and some of whom are nearly equipped to serve as paramedics, play a vital role and form the backbone of the service. The Psycho social counsellors bring emotional stability to the patient and the family so that their trauma does not stand in the way of bringing the pain and symptoms under control.



The team provides the following services, amongst others, at the patient's home:

- Pain Management
- Symptom Management
- Nursing care
- Psycho-social Counseling
- Caregiver Empowerment & Education
- End of life support
- Bereavement Counselling

PALCARE places the greatest emphasis on the quality of the care in order that the service is always of a high standard, and can meet the needs of our very serious patients at the earliest.

Bringing a Smile to their Face

The work of a palliative care professional is not an easy one. Our patients have serious health conditions and many, if not all, will pass away, most often sooner than later. The teams must encounter the distress and suffering of the patient as they navigate the journey with them, day in and day out, feeling the patient's pain as if it was their own. But what makes it so rewarding and worth every minute, is the smile on the patient's face when their suffering is mitigated by the team's tailored medical plan, compassionate nursing care and dedicated psychosocial support.

A late patient's daughter sums it up very aptly: "Their (the team's) calm demeanour, thoughtful words and humane approach towards my father brought light to a very dark situation, and my father would actually look forward to their visits. We feel peace knowing that he was under such qualified care while battling against the disease. The world is a better place because you'll be in it. Thank you for all you do and may God Bless all your endeavours."



When we enrolled our 63-year-old female patient, shown in the photograph on the left, in May 2022, she had been diagnosed with CA ovary and peritoneal metastases. Her condition caused her severe constipation and excruciating pain at the anal region and she was barely able to sit or walk. Soon after PALCARE started its medical plan, her pain was brought under control and she was able to spend the rest of her life, until her passing 7 months later, cheerfully and comfortably, in the company of her friends and family. Her gratitude to PALCARE knew no bounds and she treated the team as part of her own family, which her family continues to do till this date.



Our 94-year-old female patient, a case of Dementia and Rheumatoid Arthritis, was brought into the PALCARE fold in March 2023 and continues to be with us at the time of writing this report. When we enrolled her, she was in relentless pain and had severe muscle stiffness. Within a week of enrolment, she started feeling much better and within 15 days of commencing the medications prescribed by PALCARE, her pain was completely under control.

PALCARE taught her daughter certain non-pharmacological measures such as physiotherapy exercises and oil massages and within a month of the enrolment the muscle stiffness was also eased. She is presently very comfortable.



Our 45-year-old female patient, who enrolled with PALCARE in July 2022, is a case of Multiple Skeletal Haemangiomas, a very rare disease which renders her bed bound. PALCARE has gradually established excellent rapport with her and her family, keeping her as comfortable as possible.

Fully aware that she will never be able to function as she did prior to the onset of her condition, she nevertheless never misses a moment to cherish life. When PALCARE visits her, the home is filled with laughter, music, and animated talk on each other's lives. After each visit, the PALCARE team takes back the positive energy and zest for life that she emits.



Our 91-year-old male patient, a case of Hypertension, was diagnosed with Carcinoma Rectum and had enrolled with PALCARE in May 2022. From the beginning of his diagnosis to the end of his life, he never gave up hope. He would tell the PALCARE team that he would hit his century!

After his passing, on the team's bereavement visit, his daughters told PALCARE that they had never imagined it possible for their father to pass away so peacefully at home as they had thought he would be better off in a hospital. But they admitted, PALCARE had proved them wrong. In fact, PALCARE's holistic treatment of both pharmacological and non-pharmacological measures, had enhanced their father's quality of life, and had provided him much relief from his extensive lower limb oedema and his breathlessness. This had provided them the confidence to keep their father at home until the very end.

Our 65-year-old female patient referred from Sion Hospital's Outpatient Oncology Department enrolled with PALCARE in April 2024 for supportive management of her post-chemotherapy side effects.

With PALCARE's care plan, the patient's post-chemo symptoms were brought under control very rapidly. The patient also suffered from an injury to her foot, which, due to inadequate hygiene and lack of knowledge, became infected and developed maggots. The PALCARE team visited the patient frequently and, on each visit, painstakingly removed the maggots one by one. They instructed the patient on wound management and the patient was also able to change the dressing herself in between the team's home visits. The patient's wound has since healed well.





Our 90-year-old patient, who suffered a Cerebrovascular accident enrolled with PALCARE in May 2023.

At the time of the enrolment, the patient was suffering from severe symptom burden. She was bed bound and had right hemiparesis along with slurring of speech and urinary incontinence.

With PALCARE's supportive management and the team by her side, she is now able to stand up and walk a few steps at a time. Her speech is much better than before and comprehensible. And, her bladder is under control. She recently celebrated her 90th birthday and invited the team to participate in her joy.



Our patient, a 55-year-old female, diagnosed with breast cancer enrolled with PALCARE in January 2024. She lives alone as her husband abandoned her and they have no kids.

At the time of enrolment, she was suffering from immense pain all over her body and had frequent episodes of vomiting. Due to her disease condition, she was forced to stop working and this led to financial constraints. She also experienced acute loneliness and a sense of helplessness.

With PALCARE's clinical intervention, her pain subsided and her vomiting was brought under control. Furthermore, the patient no longer feels like she is alone but rather that there is a team of dedicated professionals who care very much for her and looks forward to the team's home visits. She is also able to get all the medications she needs from PALCARE as well as a monthly ration supply. Another NGO - V Care Foundation - has stepped in to help her with her financial stress.

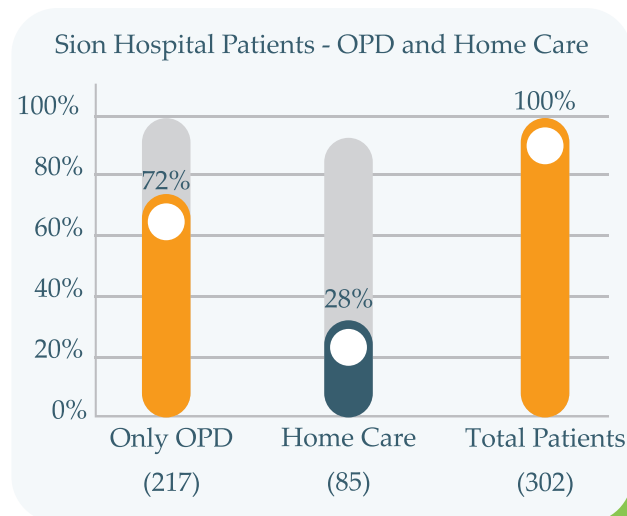
The Year That Was

Dear Stakeholder and Well-wisher,

Running a palliative care facility, and more so one that is a charitable organisation with a limited budget, is a formidable task. A task that is made more challenging by the dearth of available talent in this field of medicine. And that the PALCARE service is home based, which requires its medical staff to travel from slum to slum, chawl to chawl, often in the blistering sun or in torrential rain, makes it no easier. Convincing onco-specialists and other specialists, as also family physicians of the need for home based palliative care for their patients, and encouraging them to refer such patients to the service, is an uphill task. Last, but not least, convincing companies with CSR budgets to fund a service like ours has been daunting.

But PALCARE managed to surmount these challenges through the years; and continued to grow from strength to strength in 2023-24.

The first quarter of 2024 started off as “worrisome” months, brought about by the sudden and massive drop in referrals from PALCARE's largest source of referrals – the Tata Memorial Hospital, which had started its own home care service in recent times. But as they say, when one door closes another will open, and PALCARE found a new source of referrals with the Lokmanya Tilak Municipal General Hospital at Sion (Sion Hospital): Under the arrangement with this renowned hospital, PALCARE serves the palliative care needs of patients who visit the hospital's ONCO and HNF OPDs. Our grateful thanks to the Dean of Sion Hospital, Dr. Mohan Joshi, and to Dr. K Sethna, Head of the Department of Oncology, for placing this trust in us.





Additionally, PALCARE received 253 referrals from individual oncologists and other specialists, which is 112% more than in the previous year. We extend our gratitude to all our regular doctors for the constant trust that they place in PALCARE.

This year saw PALCARE launch its Ration Scheme. Due to the incidence of cancer in the family, often the main breadwinner is unable to go out and earn an income,

either because he/she is the patient or is the main caregiver and must look after the patient. Also, many middle-class families have been financially impacted by the huge cost of curative treatments. These patients had moaned that there was little point in taking medicines if they could not have even one square meal a day. And this prompted PALCARE to step in and help with its Ration Scheme, where PALCARE provides basic food rations (such as rice, pulses, wheat, cooking oil, etc.) to the most vulnerable and marginalized of its patients, so that they receive the nutrients they so vitally need. The scheme kicked off in October 2023, and since then to the end of the last financial year, PALCARE has provided rations to 21 families.



In November, 2023, PALCARE met up with Dr. Prathamesh Pai, Dr. Tasneem B and Dr. Farida Calcuttawalla of the newly launched Head and Neck Cancer Institute of India Hospital, to discuss a collaboration between PALCARE and HNCII where the former would look after the home care needs of the latter's patients. HNCII is founded by the well-known Dr. Sultan Pradhan, India's leading onco-surgeon for head and neck cancers. This arrangement is growing well.

Reaching out to Onco specialists. In early November 2023, PALCARE participated at the 3rd Indian Cancer Congress held at the Jio World Convention Centre, Mumbai. PALCARE displayed posters on the PALCARE service and handed out brochures to attendees in the Exhibitions section of the Congress.

Education and Professional Development continued to remain an area of vital importance to PALCARE which organised the following training sessions for its staff:

In May 2023, **Dr. Akhileswaran** {Senior Consultant, Khoo Teck Puat Hospital, Singapore} and **Dr. Jenifer Jeba** {Professor and Head in Palliative Care Unit, Christian Medical College and Hospital, Vellore} refreshed the PALCARE team's knowledge on "SIGNS OF DEATH & TREATMENT OPTIONS FOR END-OF-LIFE".

Also in May 2023, **Dr. Roop Gursahani**, Clinical Neurologist with 30 years' experience at P. D. Hinduja National Hospital, Mumbai and with special interests in Medical Epilepsy and Neuro-palliative Care and a member of the End-of-Life Care in India Taskforce (ELICIT), delivered a lecture on “PALLIATIVE CARE FOR PATIENTS WITH NEUROLOGICAL CONDITIONS”.

His engaging mode of delivery incorporated role play and the use of break out rooms to facilitate smaller group discussions

Internal Lectures: Internal Meetings

- Every Monday morning, each zonal team connected to prioritize patients as high, medium, and low and to chalk out a timetable for the week's visits.
- Once a week, PALCARE'S seven teams convened for the Weekly Clinical Meetings, at which pertinent information on new enrolments, high priority patient cases, patient discharges and patient deaths was discussed. Through this interaction and recounting of experiences in the week, there was a sharing of knowledge.
- In the last twelve months, the twenty-nine teaching sessions were held on subjects such as, amongst others,
 - Renal Disease In The Last Days Of Life
 - Dealing With Difficult Patients And Families
 - Ascites
 - Wound Management
 - Tracheostomy Care
 - Caregiver Burden And Self-care
 - Hepatic Encephalopathy
 - Good Communication In Palliative Care
 - Depression
 - End-of-life Care & Bereavement
 - Anticipatory Prescribing
 - Opioids

External Training Programmes:

From July 2023 to October 2023, nine of PALCARE's nurses participated in the Indian Association of Palliative Care's "Advanced Nursing Skills in Palliative Care (ANSPC) – Virtual Training Program for Nurses" which comprised a total of fifteen sessions.



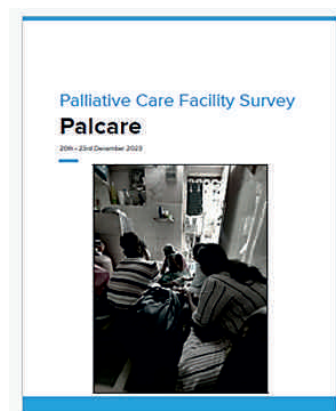
In early November, 2023, PALCARE held an intensive two-day training course in Palliative Care Counselling. The course, developed in-house, comprised aspects such as spiritual, emotional and social pain, caregiver burden, communication skills in palliative care and grief counselling.



- IAPCON 2024: From 9 to 11 February 2024, four physicians, two nurses and one counselor from PALCARE attended the 31ST International Conference of the Indian Association of Palliative Care in Gujarat, the theme of which was "Revisiting the Domains of Palliative Care". For most of the staff, it was their first time attending the conference which they found to be an enriching experience.

Collaborations:

- In November 2023, as part of their week-long observer-ship arranged by CIPLA Foundation, a visiting physician and nurse from the All India Institute of Medical Sciences, Jodhpur shadowed two of PALCARE's homecare teams headed by Dr. Sandeeta Shetty and Dr. Pranjal Ramugade while on home visits.
- A Quality Care Project organized by Cipla Foundation in the month of December 2023. In his time with PALCARE, Dr. Deepak Sudhakaran, in collaboration with Pallium India, spent three and a half days with PALCARE between Sudhakaran shadowing a different homecare team each day, at the end of which he concluded, backed by a written report, that PALCARE's model of home-based palliative care was of a universally high standard across all teams



- In early November 2023, PALCARE participated at the 3rd Indian Cancer Congress held at the Jio World Convention Centre, Mumbai, where it participated in the Exhibitions section – displaying posters on the PALCARE service and handing out brochures to attendees. This was in collaboration with the Indian Cancer Society and PALCARE was able to reach out to several onco-specialists
- WORLD CANCER DAY 2024: For the occasion of World Cancer Day held on 4 February 2024, the Nargis Dutt Foundation organized an event at the Carter Road Amphitheater, Bandra, which was attended by several eminent physicians. PALCARE was presented with a memento for its partnership and support.



Staff Welfare:

Recognizing the importance of helping staff **de-stress and take time off to be with colleagues in a non-work environment**, so that they bond with each other, and break away from the pressure and strain of dealing with patients and families undergoing huge trauma, PALCARE organized two staff lunches in the months of October 2023 and February 2024. Staff members let their hair down and thoroughly enjoyed the comradery that both events provided them.

Donors - Our Bloodline

As a charitable foundation we are totally dependent on the generosity of major grantors, CSR and individual donors including patients who donate, however poor or affluent they may be. 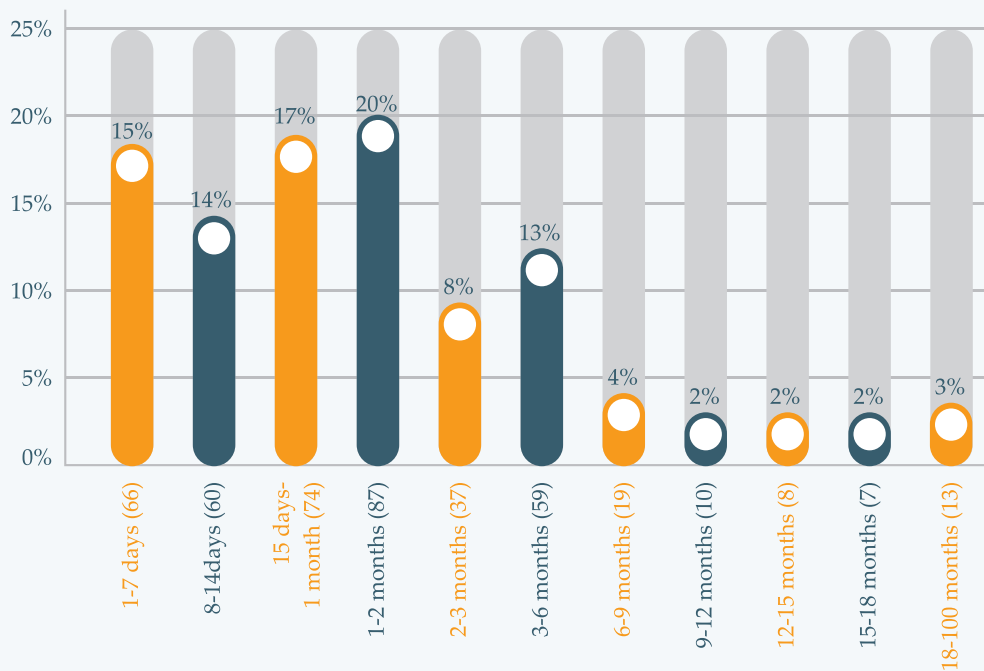

• Our Patients in 2023-24



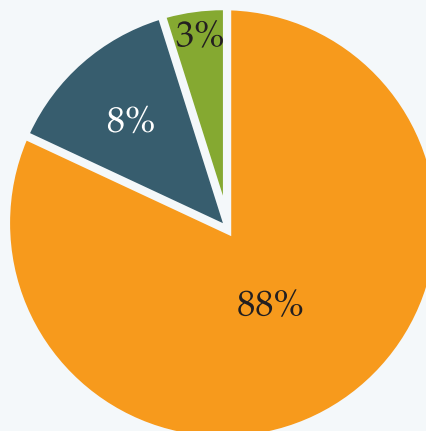
NUMBER OF DAYS WITH PALCARE (DEMISED PATIENTS) - 440 PATIENTS

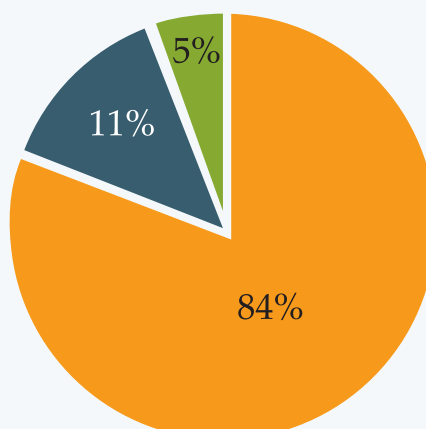

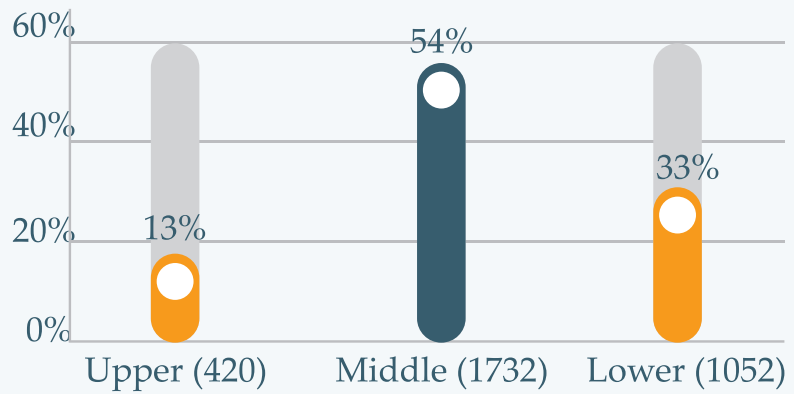


Place of Death

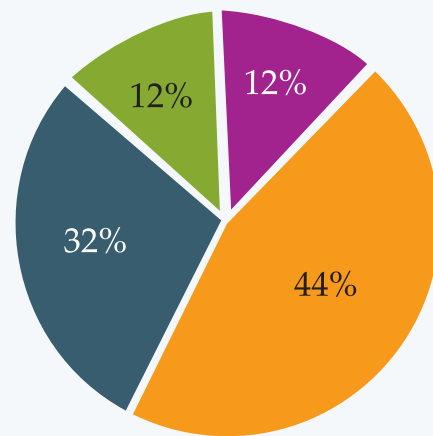


By Socio - Economic

inception - 3204

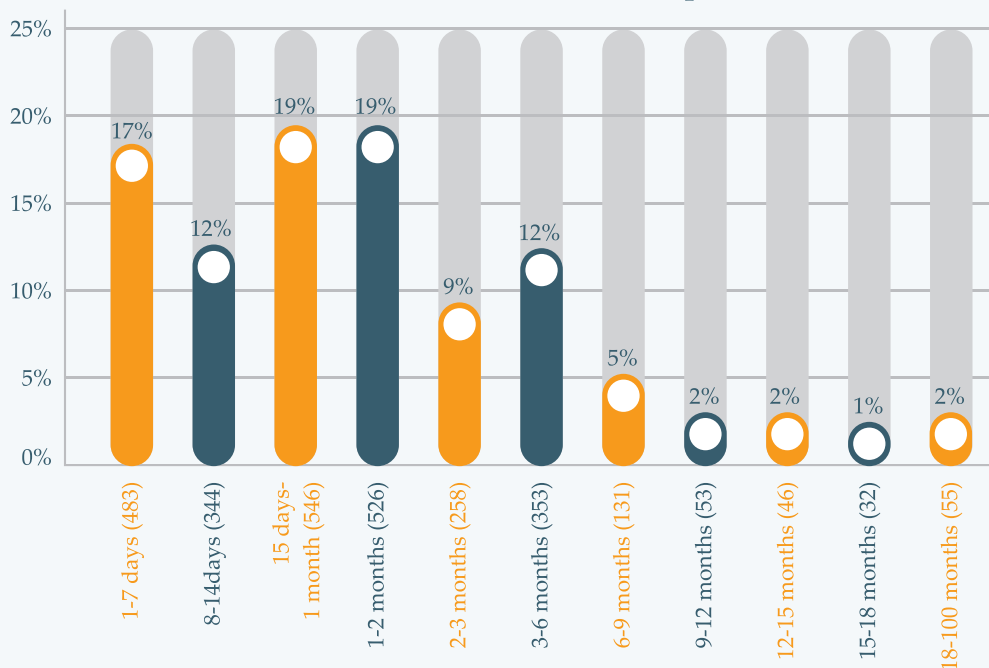


Patients By Referrals
